

Recent Searches for Beyond Standard Model Effects at BABAR

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In the recent past, several hints of inconsistencies between experimental results and theory predictions in the framework of the Standard Model (SM) have been obtained from measurement of *B*-meson decays, though no beyond-SM (BSM) effects have been observed yet. We report here about a few recent searches for BSM effects in B-meson decays performed with the full BaBar data sample, collected at the energy of the $\Upsilon(4S)$ resonance, which corresponds to 471 million $B\bar{B}$ pairs. Among these measurements of semileptonic decays involving the tau lepton, which evidenced a significant discrepancy with the SM predictions, and of the rare flavour changing neutral current processes $B \to K^{(*)}l^+l^-$ where $l = e, \mu, \tau$. The latter, highly suppressed in the SM, occur at lowest order via 1-loop diagrams, and contributions from virtual particles in the loop allow one to probe large mass scales at relatively low energies. In particular, the decays $B \to K^*e^+e^-$ and $B \to K^*\mu^+\mu^-$ (both charged and neutral modes) are studied using an angular analysis to extract the quantities $A_{\rm FB}$ and $F_{\rm L}$, and the quantity P_2 , which is subject to smaller theoretical uncertainties and is more sensitive to non-SM contributions. 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1. Introduction

The flavor-changing neutral current (FCNC) decays $B \to K^{(*)}\ell^+\ell^-$ where $\ell^{\pm} = e^{\pm}$, μ^{\pm}, τ^{\pm} are forbidden in the SM at tree level. They proceed at higher orders via penguin loops and box diagrams. New physics (NP) effects introduce new loops with new particles. These decays probe new physics effects at a scale of a few TeV. In particular, angular observables bear high sensitivity to NP contributions. The decay $B^{\pm} \to K^{\pm}\tau^+\tau^-$ is highly suppressed in the SM and the τ may couple more strongly to NP processes than to light leptons. In both analyses we use the full *BABAR* data sample of $(471 \pm 3) \times 10^6 B\bar{B}$ events.

2. Angular Asymmetries in the Decays $B \rightarrow K^* \ell^+ \ell^-$

The $B \to K^* \ell^+ \ell^-$ angular distribution depends on three angles: θ_K , the angle between the Kaon and the *B* meson in K^* rest frame; θ_ℓ , the angle between ℓ^+ (ℓ^-) and the *B* (\overline{B}) meson in $\ell^+ \ell^-$ rest frame; ϕ , the angle between the di-lepton and the $K\pi$ decay planes. The full angular distribution involves 12 q^2 -dependent parameters [1]. Since the *BABAR* data sample is too small to measure them all in different regions of q^2 , we fit the one-dimensional projections

$$W(\cos\theta_{\ell}) = \frac{3}{4}F_{\rm L}(q^2)\sin^2\theta_{\ell} + \frac{3}{8}(1 - F_{\rm L}(q^2))(1 + \cos^2\theta_{\ell}) + A_{\rm FB}(q^2)\cos\theta_{\ell}, \qquad (2.2)$$

which depend only on the K^* longitudinal polarization, $F_L(q^2)$, and the lepton forward-backward asymmetry, $A_{FB}(q^2)$. We measure these in five disjoint q^2 bins and in $q_0^2 = 1 - 6 \text{ GeV}^2$. We further determine $P_2(q^2) = (-2/3) \times A_{FB}(q^2)/(1 - F_L(q^2))$ that has smaller theory errors.




Figure 1: Distributions of m_{ES} (left), $m_{K\pi}$ (middle) and L_{R} (right) for data (points), total fit (blue line), combinatorial background (magenta dashes), charmonium feed-down (black dots) and cross-feed (red dashes).

We reconstruct five final states: $B^+ \to K^{*+}(\to K^0_S \pi^+)\mu^+\mu^-$, $B^0 \to K^{*0}(\to K^+\pi^-)\mu^+\mu^-$, $B^+ \to K^{*+}(\to K^0_S \pi^+) e^+ e^-, B^+ \to K^{*+}(\to K^+ \pi^0) e^+ e^- \text{ and } B^0 \to K^{*0}(\to K^+ \pi^-) e^+ e^-$ [2]. We employ standard requirements on $m_{\rm ES}$ (beam-energy constrained mass) and ΔE (energy difference between B meson and beam energies) to select signal. To reduce $B\bar{B}$ and $e^+e^- \rightarrow q\bar{q}$ background contributions we define eight bagged decision trees with ten input variables for e^+e^- and $\mu^+\mu^$ modes for low and high q^2 . We combine the $B\bar{B}$ BDT outputs into a likelihood ratio L_R . First, we perform an initial three-dimensional maximum-likelihood fit to $m_{\rm ES}$, $m_{K\pi}$ and $L_{\rm R}$ for each mode separately. We fix the normalization and probability density functions (pdf) for m_{ES} , $m_{K\pi}$ and L_{R} . Figure 1 shows the $m_{\rm ES}$, $m_{K\pi}$ and $L_{\rm R}$ projections for $B^0 \to K^{*0} (\to K^+\pi^-) e^+e^-$ in the last bin q^2 with results of the initial fit overlaid. We repeat these fits in the angular-fit signal region ($m_{\rm ES}$ > 5.27 GeV/c²). We then add $\cos \theta_K$ as a fourth variable to the likelihood function with $F_{\rm L}(q^2)$ as the only free parameter keeping all other parameters fixed. In the last step we replace $\cos \theta_K$ with $\cos \theta_{\ell}$ as the fourth variable in the likelihood function with $A_{\rm FB}$ as the only free parameter keeping all other parameters and $F_{\rm L}(q^2)$ fixed. We determine each angular result subsequently by direct construction and examination of the log(L) curves from a scan across entire $F_L(q^2)$ and $A_{FB}(q^2)$ parameter space. We characterize the pdfs for $m_{\rm ES}$, $m(K\pi)$, $L_{\rm R}$, $\cos\theta_K$ and $\cos\theta_\ell$ for correctly reconstructed signal events, for random combinatorial backgrounds, for backgrounds from $J/\psi K^*$ and $\psi(2S)K^*$ decays and for backgrounds in which hadrons are misidentified as muons.




Figure 2: *BABAR* measurements of $F_L(q^2)$ (top), $A_{FB}(q^2)$ (middle) and $P_2(q^2)$ (bottom) for B^+ modes (magenta upward triangle), B^0 modes (red downward triangle) and their combination (blue square) in comparison to the SM prediction (blue dash/blue box) defining also the extent of the q^2 bin, and results from Belle (black star), CDF (black point), LHCb (open square/green box), CMS (open circle) and ATLAS (large star). The grey-shaded regions show the J/ψ and $\psi(2S)$ vetoes.

Figure 2 shows our results for $F_L(q^2)$, $A_{FB}(q^2)$ and $P_2(q^2)$ for B^+ modes, B^0 modes and their combination [2] for five bins of q^2 in comparison to the SM prediction [3] and measurements from Belle [4], CDF [5], CMS [6], ATLAS [7] and LHCb [8, 9]. For B^+ modes $F_L(q^2)$ below the J/ψ shows deviations from the SM predictions that are $> 3\sigma$ for the second q^2 bin while $A_{FB}(q^2)$ and $P_2(q^2)$ are consistent with the SM. For B^0 modes $F_L(q^2)$ is consistent with the SM except for the second q^2 bin where the discrepancy is $> 3\sigma$ whereas $A_{FB}(q^2)$ and $P_2(q^2)$ agree with the SM prediction. The latest LHCb measurements of $F_L(q^2)$ and $A_{FB}(q^2)$ measured in the decay $B^0 \to K^{*0}\mu^+\mu^-$ show good agreement with the SM prediction.

3. Search for the Decay $B^{\pm} \rightarrow K^{\pm} \tau^{+} \tau^{-}$

We tag one *B* meson via full hadronic reconstruction (B_{tag}) using standard m_{ES} and ΔE selections and look for $B^+ \to K^+ \tau^+ \tau^-$ signal in the recoil [10]. The B_{tag} accounts for 2968 hadronic decays of $B \to X_c X$ with $[X_c = D^{(*)0}, D^{(*)\pm}, D_s^{(*)\pm}, J/\psi; X \leq 5(K^{\pm,0} + \pi^{\pm,0})]$. Reconstructing both taus in purely leptonic modes, we require exactly three charged tracks with the correct particle identification plus missing energy. We remove 75% of the $q\bar{q}$ background while retaining 80% of all $B\bar{B}$ events with the help of a multivariate likelihood ratio in which $B\bar{B}$ pdfs and $q\bar{q}$ pdfs for six event shape variables are combined. We remove events for which the $K \mp \ell^{\pm}$ mass is consistent with a D^0 , the di-lepton mass is consistent with a J/ψ or the summed energy in the electromagnetic calorimeter is larger than 50 MeV. We reduce the main peaking background from $B \to \bar{D}^{(*)}\ell^+\nu$ with $\bar{D}^{(*)} \to K\ell'^-\bar{\nu}$ with a multi-layer perceptron (MLP) neural network trained with eight kinematic and event shape variables. The dominant systematic uncertainties result from particle ID, the π^0 veto, theory and MLP neural network. The observed yield is 176 ± 13 events compared to the expected background of 154.4 ± 7.1 events. The excess is at the 2σ level and we set a branching fraction upper limit of $\mathscr{B}(B^+ \to K^+\tau^+\tau^-) < 2.25 \times 10^{-3}$ @ 90% confidence level (CL).

4. Conclusion

We measured the angular distributions of $B^+ \to K^{*+}\ell^+\ell^-$ and $B^0 \to K^{*0}\ell^+\ell^-$ extracting the $F_L(q^2)$, $A_{FB}(q^2)$ and $P_2(q^2)$ in five disjoint bins of q^2 and for $q_0^2 = 1 - 6 \text{ GeV}^2$. For $F_L(q^2)$ we see deviations from the SM for q^2 below the J/ψ , in particular for B^+ modes, whereas $A_{FB}(q^2)$ and $P_2(q^2)$ are consistent with the SM. We searched for $B^{\pm} \to K^{\pm}\tau^+\tau^-$ and set a branching fraction upper limit of $\mathscr{B}(B^+ \to K^+\tau^+\tau^-) < 2.25 \times 10^{-3}$ @ 90% CL.

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
